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Internet Voting Is Here!

Instead of completing and returning the paper ballot (included Lin this issue), you may cast your vote via the Internet. All that is required is that you have a valid email address on file in the DOAI member database. We will be using a free Internet voting service provided by ballotbin.com.

If you vote via Internet

Internet voting is quick and easy. When the Internet voting opens at 12:01 EST October 1, 2009, you will receive an email from ballotbin.com (if you don't find it in your inbox, check your junk folder). This email will contain a link that will take you to the DOAI ballot. Make your selections and cast vour vote.

You can only click the link **once** since each member coach is only allowed one vote (same as the paper ballot). Procedures are in place to prevent voting both via the Internet and with a paper ballot. If someone submits both a paper ballot and Internet ballot, the Internet ballot will be counted and the paper by Bob Cook ballot will be discarded.

The Internet voting list will show email addresses that have voted (but not how each voted), and each email address will show the membership number tied to that address. This list will be transmitted to the chairman of the nominating committee, Phil Yovino, when the Internet voting closes at 11:59 p.m. EST November 15, 2009, accompanied by a list of total votes per candidate.

If you vote via paper ballot

If you choose to cast a paper ballot, you may send in your ballot at any time (you don't have to wait until October 1). The paper ballots must be received by Phil no later than **November 15.** The counting of paper ballots will begin on November 16.

The paper ballots must have your membership number and two-letter region designation on the upper left-hand corner of the mailing label portion of the ballot (if you neglect to put

that information on the label, your ballot will not be counted and will be discarded). Before the paper ballot is opened for counting, a DOAI member (who will not be a counter) will check the membership number against the Internet voting list to make sure that member has not voted via the Internet. Then the membership number will be checked against the DOAI member database to make sure the voter is a duescurrent member.

Once the legitimacy of the ballot is confirmed, the membership number is physically removed from the front of the ballot (the twoletter region designation is left on the label so the counters can make sure the vote for region vice president is for the correct region), and the ballot is given to the two people who will be counting the paper ballots.

Bottom line

The counters of the paper ballots will not know who voted for which candidate, but they will be assured that only one vote per member coach is counted. This method, while a bit complicated, ensures your vote is private.

NOTE: ballotbin.com does not sell nor spam your email address. They have been providing this service for several years, and they make their money from donations and advertisements.



A sample of the Internet ballot. Your ballotbin.com ballot will include only the region vice president candidate(s) for your region.


Membership Director's Report

Discovery Modifications

Late last year, I installed a ceiling fan in our bedroom. We have a 1997 36RS; I realize that how I did it may be different for those of you with higher ceilings and/or newer models. And frankly, I just did my usual "hack and cut" to do what I wanted, but this time it actually worked!

I started with a cheap 42-inch ceiling hugger fan (how cheap? I




Blades shortened by re-drilling and changing the screw locations



bought it NIB at a garage sale for \$2.00!). I modified the blades – shortened them by a few inches for a bit of insurance that I wouldn't walk into them (photo left).

I used the AC duct as the wire raceway. I removed the filter and bottom ductwork to gain

access to the duct itself. I cut a couple of 12-inch lengths of 1.5x3-inch aluminum angle from a commercial rain gutter extrusion. I drilled a 1/4-inch hole at a guesstimated place on the longer leg of the angles. The guesswork was not far to place it from the edge of the angle so the fan bracket would line up in the end.

I located where I wanted the center of the fan mount on the ceiling. Using the fan mount bracket as a guide, I drilled two holes through the ceiling and into the AC duct. I then used a wire to push a string into each hole from the bottom until I could grab them from the AC outlet. Then I pushed a string through one of the angle reinforcements and tied a large knot on the inside of the angle legs. The drawing of the roof cross section (photo above) shows what I did.

I put a thick coat of an adhesive (Liquid Nails®) on the aluminum where it would contact the foam duct. Placing the angle into the duct and pulling on the string at the same time positioned the angle to where I wanted it in the duct. Then I did the other one the same way. **Hint #1:** Place the nozzle of the adhesive tube into the hole through the

ceiling and squeeze a liberal amount into the duct *instead* of dragging an adhesive mess through the duct as I did.

I put some weight on each cord to hold them in contact with the foam duct and let the adhesive dry overnight. **Hint #2:**

I could have used a couple of drill-pointed screws to hold them instead of waiting for the adhesive to dry.

The next day, I drilled a larger diameter hole to match the expanding toggle nut I placed into each hole and through the aluminum. I attached the fan bracket securely to the ceiling and drilled the wire hole through the center. I pushed a length of wire

into the foam duct and out the AC ductwork.

I then went to work on the electrical outlet inside the rear TV enclosure. I started to replace the single outlet with a duplex receptacle. **Hint #3:** Don't. Those are #10-gauge wires and they don't bend easily (photo above). I spliced on another outlet into the wiring after I repaired my mistake. I drilled a hole up through the enclosure to the foam duct. This allowed me to feed the wire through the duct and have it exit in the TV enclosure to my new receptacle.

After fishing the wire through the hole into the TV area and adding a male plug on the end, I reassembled the AC parts. I plugged it in and pulled the switch. Everything worked and no sparks! Another light between the two already installed over the bed was too much. I removed the light that came with the fan. I discovered that the lid off a peanut butter jar just slipped over the open area where the light was. A shot of white paint finished it.

Due to the fan being mounted in a small area, the blades could not gather enough air to provide the breeze that I desired. Placing the fan in reverse (pushing the air into the ceiling), however, works wonders. There is gentle air movement throughout the bedroom without the usual blast from being directly under a ceiling fan. Success!

Repair of Day/Night Shades

Have you had the misfortune to have one of your day/night shades break? I guess that is a dumb question, as it seems like everyone has this issue, one shade after another – unless you are fortunate enough to have an RV manufacturer build your unit with better-made shades. After having most of mine break within a year and replacements breaking soon after installation, I thought it was time to do something different.

It seems there are two problems. One: the shade manufacturer claims a major problem is the way in which the shades are installed and

adjusted by the RV manufacturers – the shades are 'way too tight. If you don't have issues yet, take the time to loosen each so they *just* stay up.

Two: The eyelets used and installed by the shade manufacturer are a crimped one-piece eyelet that is installed upside down. If you look closely at the picture, you can see the

rough edges of the eyelet as installed. If they would have installed the eyelets the other way around, the cord would bend around a large smooth radius surface.

After repairing my shades, I have never had another one break. A second benefit is they run up and down so easy, it is like they are greased. I hope this helps anyone with the problem. I know I found the shades quite frustrating until they were repaired properly.

Do not send them back to the factory

to be re-strung — you are wasting your money. Invest \$10 in materials to repair your own and your problems are over. For detailed instructions on how to repair the shades, go to http://www.discoveryowners.com/daynightshades.asp and click on photo; a PDF file will download which includes diagrams supplied by a shade manufacturer.

Part Two: A Chapter of Our Lives Has Closedby Pete Shaffer BigD Fire Aftermath - Disposal

re inanimate objects alive? Like your motor coach, is she A re inanimate objects alive: Like you. Malive? I am in the "yes" camp, but I would probably think

my wife is in the "no" camp. My dad said that cars and boats are "shes" because we have to love them, care for them and even fix them all the time. Not sure what he actually meant by "fix them," but since Mom and Dad had six of us kids. I'm thinking he did not mean what we just did to our dog. I will leave that up to you to decide.

My coach, the BigD, was alive. I applied all of Dad's logic about these things and yes, she was alive. Let me explain. First a disclaimer. All references to "she" are about the coach, even though some comparisons could be drawn at times to my better half.

Now that the shock of losing my beloved coach to fire has passed, I pressed on to the mechanical part of any loss, getting rid of her remains. She was a big pile of black, smelly, leaking rubble, and she had to go. This should have been easy. It was not.

On April 6, I called the insurance company to report the loss and ask what I needed to do. They talked about appraising the vehicle, salvage and/or disposal. I asked if they could fast-track the disposal, since there were fluids (diesel, power steering, stabilizer jack and room slide hydraulic and maybe transmission and engine oils and antifreeze) leaking all over our side yard, and propane gas was leaking from one of the two tanks. The response I received showed me he had no idea what his company had insured. "What were you doing with propane in your car?" I explained it was a motor coach, or motor home and he said ,"Oh" - you know that kind of "oh" you say when you don't have a clue, and probably under his breath was saying, "Why did I have to get this call?" Then he promised a speedy resolution and said something like "we will have it out of your way in a few days." It took three weeks and a day.

And the fun begins...

The first towing/salvage company to call told me they would be here "tomorrow." I

asked if they knew what they were picking up and he said, "We do this all the time, we know what we are Pete Shaffer doing, trust me." I



said, "Fine. Just make sure your truck can handle 20,000 pounds.'

He was quiet for a few seconds and then said, "Okay, tell me what." I explained it was a 37-foot-long motor home and in her current location there was a steep 400-foot-long gravel driveway to ascend. He said he'd better drive out here first to look around before bringing his wrecker. Tomorrow never came for him. In fact, four tomorrows never came for him. On the fifth tomorrow, after yet another call to see where he was, I was told they were too busy and no longer interested in towing my "truck."

The insurance company sent out another towing/salvage company to do the deed. Another phone call and another explanation that this was a 20,000-pound 37-foot-long motor home (no one understands the "motor coach" title). He said, "No problem; we do this all the time and we know what we are doing, trust me. Kind of like a Greyhound bus right?" Don't you just hate it when someone refers to your coach as a bus?

Tomorrow came and went, and I called. "Tomorrow for sure," he said. I waited and, lo and behold, he was right. The next day someone drove up our driveway, got out and started to look around. With his hand over his mouth. he kept mumbling, "Omigod, omigod, omigod," over and over and over again. I asked what was wrong and he said,"This thing is huge! I thought it was going to be a large pickup truck. Omigod." After about a half hour of "omigods," he left, never to return.


The insurance company sent out the third towing/salvage company. Another call and another tomorrow. After three tomorrows, they showed up and left without even getting out of their truck, never to return.

The insurance company sent the fourth and final salvage company to remove the BigD. This time he came unannounced in a large tractor and 55-foot flatbed/trailer combination. The driver had to park at the bottom of our drive and walk up to the house. "I can't make the turn to get up your driveway," he said, waiting for me to offer some sort of solution to his problem.

About then, a blowing horn sounded, announcing he was blocking the road and the school bus couldn't get past.

"Where does this road come out?" he asked. I informed

him it dead-ended in about a half mile and I didn't know any driveway big enough for him to turn around in. A four-letter word escaped and he started to walk back down. I jumped on my tractor and cut across the fields and went down the hill and got in front of him, then drove down Goose Creek road to find a wide spot for him to pull over to let the traffic pass. After he parked, I drove him back up the grass-covered hill with him screaming in my ear, "We can't make it up *that* hill in

this, can we?" and another four-letter word escaped his mouth. (Okay, maybe I was showing off just a little, but isn't that what boys do?)

We live in a semi-rural area on a ridge top with a fantastic view. Payment for this view is a steep driveway that spirals around the hill on its way to the top. The BigD never had problems with the turn at the driveway entrance, nor the climb up to the top to her parking spot, but apparently large trucks do.

He looked things over and announced he was going to return to his garage some two hours away and talk it over with the boss. Some of the possibilities were to cut the coach up into three parts, load it onto three smaller trucks, or even fly a helicopter in to lift the coach out, or somehow drag her down the hill.

Four tomorrows later they returned with several men, the tractor trailer/flatbed and a medium-sized tow truck. Their plan was to put a tire on

the side where both rear tires burned and exploded, mechanically release the rear brakes using a caging bolt, lift up the front end and tow her down the drive. Once at the bottom of the drive and on the county road, he planned to back the tow truck pushing BigD up and onto the trailer. All this was planned so school buses wouldn't be a problem. A solution to the problem of 20,000 pounds going downhill brakeless pushing the tow truck out of control was to simply lower the front end and let the frame drag.

All went well. Within two hours she was loaded onto the flatbed, and this is when things got real interesting. Remember

when I asked if you thought inanimate objects are alive? Well I swear, she was fighting her final removal with all she had. After all, she was mine for ten years, and we grew up together and I loved her, cared for her and constantly fixed her. Once on the trailer she must have realized she was about to lose the battle to stay home. She must have summoned some inner strength and called out to all the critters large and small to help.

I heard a yelp and another four-letter word and knew something was wrong with the flatbed driver. I ran over expecting to see blood, but was instead greeted with another

four-letter word and pointing. "Big black ... with feathers, ran under the trailer from that wooded area to that one. Several of them." I replied he had just met our resident wild turkeys and not to worry. As I turned away we heard a loud snort, kind of like air gushing out of a tire, and then we saw movement. A big buck was no more than ten feet away, and scared the heebie-jeebies out of the driver. Another four-letter word.

Then we heard what can only be described as girls crying. Several of

them, and they were close. Very close. All of a sudden, four goats emerged from the wooded area and started toward the

wreck of the BigD. The driver, clearly out of his realm in the wooded countryside, looked stunned, and looked to me to tell him what to do. About then it started to rain. Another four-letter word and the driver started for the cab of the truck with the goats close behind. Something I didn't know was that goats don't like the rain. So they went to the only shelter they could find - under the trailer with the BigD on top. The four goats under the trailer refusing to leave ... car horns sounding, announcing someone wants to get by ... then more horns. It was like the races had just let out! The driver shrugged and pointed to the four goats, saying, "I'll squash them if I try and move this thing. What do I do?" A neighbor got out of her car and started to swear like a drunken sailor, throwing sticks and stones at the goats. They didn't move.

I did the only thing I could think of: I called the county sheriff. They sent a detective out to investigate and find out who owned the goats. As we were standing around talking, I mentioned that the goats were on the lam and were fugitives. "Why don't you put them into the back of your cruiser and take them downtown and 'grill' them?" I asked. My attempt at humor was met with the look like I was from outer space.

Finally a neighbor in a pickup brought some kind of feed over and enticed the goats to leave the sanctuary of the trailer to feast on sweet goat treats. The flatbed driver took this opportunity to drive away and be rid of this place.

The last I saw of her, the four goats were trotting behind yelling, "Nooooooo, nooooooo, nooooooo" in little girl voices. (Those of you who have goats will know what I mean. The rest of you probably think I'm nuts, and you're probably right.)

With the BigD gone, I went back up the hill to clean up what remained. The driveway was scarred from dragging her down hill, a driveway pipe was damaged when she ran over the end and squashed it, and 2,100 pounds of burnt debris had to be gathered up and hauled off to the dump. I told you, the BigD fought her removal with everything she had left in her.

I'll never forget the fun times we had, and the Discovery rallies were highlights of our adventures. I'll never forget the people we met. A lot of them emailed me to say how sorry they were. Now I understand why her former owner cried as she watched her motor coach leave her yard for the last time when Sharon and I bought the BigD ten years ago. I cried, too.

BigD fire aftermath and some advice

Insurance is something all responsible people have to protect themselves and loved ones when catastrophic events occur in their lives. Everyone draws their own lines where they need and can afford insurance coverage. I have insurance on all of my vehicles and selected a deductible we could live with if anything should happen.

Motor coaches are an odd mix of vehicle and house. With my insurance company, they looked at the loss in two parts. One was the vehicle and it was handled by one division located in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, and the house portion or personal property contents was handled by the property division in Ohio. Since the fire occurred while the BigD was parked on our home property, the insurer allowed us to be reimbursed

under that policy. We had replacement coverage for contents and thought this was going to be easy. Did you know when you lose everything, the insurance company wants you to make a list of all items lost, its age and current value? Everything? How many spoons do you have in the kitchen drawer? Did you remember the tools you have? What about the silk flowers on the table? How many bath towels? Do you know all this? Our list was four pages long. Sharon and I composed the list by each of us making the list, then we compared notes. We walked around this house looking in all closets and drawers saying, "Did we have one of these in the BigD? Did you remember to put that window fan on the list?" What about the change everyone always keeps for newspapers? Frisbees for the dog, and tennis balls?

Some insurance companies ask you to take pictures of everything in the house and they store them for you. I recommend you take them up on the offer. It protects them as well as you.

A final note

In May we settled with the insurance company on the coach; around June 1, we received the check for the contents.

Editor's Note: Pete's insurance advice is good. We should all heed them. Bob and I have our D, cars, and house insured by State Farm. Last year they had a special offer: we could download a free version of "Home Inventory," a software package that takes us through, step by step, everything we need to do to document our belongings in the home – and the RV! While we haven't finished the project yet, Pete and Sharon's experience has lit a fire under us (figuratively speaking, that is), and we're determined to "git 'er done" soon. I extend thanks to Pete for sharing his experiences with us and we wish the Shaffers well.

It began as any other traveling day on the road in our 2001 Discovery. That day, June 8, 2009, we were traveling I-84 in Connecticut. We had just driven through New York, over some very bad roads. Was that the root

Webmascan determine the age of your own tires ter Toni (there is a secret, hard-to-understand code on



each one). The fact is, once a tire is six or seven years old, it is dangerous – no matter how much tread remains. In a second, its tread could peel right off the tire, sending your vehicle out of control. A trucker's tip for checking weathering and aging of tires is to run the palm of your hand around the outside of the tire. If your hand is black, it is time to look at replacing the tires and keeping a closer eye on them until you do. Checking that inside dual is as equally important. Put some time aside and review the links above. Besides reducing time on the road with tire failures, it may a life.

DuPont™Corian® Care

Chris Coats posted this question: "Just noticed the back piece of Corian that covers the cooktop is bowed in the middle. I'm not sure if someone put it back in place while the range was still hot or what. Anyone have suggestions on what can to be done to straighten it?"



Joe Brown responded: "A friend was successful in heating his cover The miracles of science- upside-down over the oven vent until it

slumped back to level. [Corian] is nothing but hard plastic."

Chris later responded: "I turned on the oven to 350° and let it heat up. I placed the warped Corian piece in the oven upsidedown (it was the back piece) and then placed the front piece (also upside-down) in front of it, then placed a 25-pound weight on the back piece (overlapping onto the front piece) and let it set for 15 minutes. Then I turned the oven off and let it set until morning. The next morning, the piece was back to its original shape. Hint: I had the weight overlapping onto the front piece so the warped piece would only shape back to its original shape, fitting smoothly and evenly with the front piece."

Linda Bethane commented that "while we have been very careful in how we treat [Corian], we have these small scratches that seem to have come from just sliding a bottle or coffeepot over the Corian. We have stopped sliding things, but have not been able to remove the scratches, even when we tried various Corian polishes."

Nina Soltwedel visited the DuPont Web site and found these guidelines regarding care of Corian:

- **★** Use a trivet or pad for setting down hot pots and pans onto Corian surfaces
- Most Corian counters will chip or dent if they are hit with a heavy object, so try not to bang heavy pots or equipment
- **★** Do your chopping and dicing on a wooden or plastic chopping board, not the bare counter. Chopping boards prevent scratches and dents in the counter surface, which are unsightly and can harbor dangerous bacteria.
- * Allow cookware to cool before placing them on the counter and into a Corian sink (most D's have Corian sinks).

Another visit to the DuPont Web site on Corian uncovered a section with detailed polishing instructions. To begin, go to http://www2.dupont.com/Surfaces/en_US/ assets/pdf/Care and Maintenance.pdf to download and read (or print out) a two-page care brochure. However, the most detailed instructions, including removing abrasions, is found in the general tips area at http://www2.dupont.com/Surfaces/ en_US/products/corian/corian_care.html Not only does that document tell one how to do it, it even explains what to use ቖ and where to purchase the supplies.

Be Wise - Winterize!

Timely Winterization Prevents Costly Freeze Damage

For those who will be storing their RVs during the winter months, the time is approaching to winterize your RV's water system. Even if you plan to use the RV to snowbird this winter, you may need to winterize until your departure date or leave the system winterized until you travel far enough south to escape winter's grip.



Why Winterize?

Winterizing is essential in climates with subfreezing temperatures and advisable in warmer climates where the temperature can take sudden dips down to freeze territory. The natural expansion of water as it freezes can rupture water lines, fittings and tanks, causing damage to faucets and allowing water to seep into walls and floors once temperatures rise again. This escaping water can be quite

mischievous, inviting mold and mildew, discoloring surfaces and weakening structural elements. Worst of all, you may not even be aware that you have a leak, so the damage can be hidden for months or years until it becomes quite serious, requiring extensive - and expensive - repairs.

DIY Project

Winterizing your RV isn't difficult, but it does take some time and must be done in the correct order to ensure no freezable water is left in the system to do damage. Here are the basic steps:

Step 1: Drain the freshwater tank and the water heater. Consider recycling the fresh water you drain to water plants, trees or grass in your yard by catching the run-off in a bucket.

Step 2: Use a blow out plug or hose with compressed air to remove as much residual water from the lines as possible. This may require a helper to open faucets inside the RV as you connect the air hose from a compressor to the city water connection. Remove the drain plug or anode rod from the water heater to empty it out faster. When using compressed air, remember to have at least one faucet or drain valve open at all times to prevent damage to lines and faucets.

Step 3: If your RV does not have a water heater bypass, now is the time to install one, so antifreeze won't fill the water heater tank. If your RV has a built-in filter system or an ice maker, you will also need to activate a bypass on those. Antifreeze will render a filter cartridge unusable and damage an ice maker.

Step 4: With bypass(es) in place, pump RV antifreeze – never automotive antifreeze - throughout the fresh water system until pink antifreeze runs from every faucet, the shower, the toilet when flushed, and the exterior shower, if so equipped.

Step 5: Empty black and grey water holding tanks at an approved dump station. Add a cup of antifreeze to the black water waste tank and the grey water waste tank plus a half cup of antifreeze to sink, tub, or shower drain p-traps and the toilet valve. **©**
