It's election time and here are important instructions

Bios of candidates running for office are on pages 11-12. On pages 13-14 you will find the mail-in paper ballot.

We encourage you, however, to vote electronically. All that is required is that you have a valid email address <u>on file</u> in the DOAI member database. We will be using a free Internet voting service provided by www.ballotbin.com.

If you vote via Internet

Please read these instructions carefully, as some changes have been made: Internet voting is quick and easy. When the Internet voting opens at 12:01 a.m. ET October 1, 2015, you will receive one email from ballotbin.com (if you don't find it in your inbox, check your junk folder). This will be sent to your email address on file with DOAI (to check that address: from any DOAI webpage, click the Login tile on the left of your screen and log in; your email address that will be used will be displayed). This email will only be sent once to ensure the integrity of the Internet voting process, so if blocked by your ISP or your email client, it cannot be re-sent and you must use the paper ballot.

Internet voting is available to all members in good standing as of **September 15, 2015**. The email will contain a link that will take you to the DOAI ballot. Make your selections and cast your vote. You can only click the link **once** since each member coach is only allowed one vote (same as the paper ballot). Procedures are in place to prevent voting both via the Internet and with a paper ballot. If someone submits both a paper ballot and Internet ballot, the Internet ballot will be counted and the paper ballot will be discarded.

The Internet voting list will show email addresses that have voted (but not how each voted), and each email address will show the membership number tied to that address. This list will be transmitted to the chairman of the nominating committee, **Marshall Godwin**, when the Internet voting closes at 11:59 p.m. ET November 15, 2015, accompanied by a list of total votes per candidate.

If you vote via paper ballot

If you choose to cast a paper ballot, you may send in your ballot at any time (you don't have to wait until October 1). The paper ballots must be received by Marshall **no later than November 15.** The counting of paper ballots will begin on November 16.

The paper ballots **must** have your membership number **and** two-letter region designation on the upper left-hand corner of the mailing label portion of the ballot (if you neglect to put that information on the label, your ballot will not be counted and will be discarded). Before the paper ballot is

opened for counting, a DOAI member (who will <u>not</u> be a counter) will check the membership number against the Internet voting list to make sure that member has not voted via the Internet. Then the membership number will be checked against the DOAI member database to make sure the voter is a dues-current member.

Once the legitimacy of the ballot is confirmed, the membership number is physically removed from the front of the ballot (the two-letter region designation is left on the label so the counters can make sure the vote for region vice president is for the correct region), and the ballot is given to the two people who will be counting the paper ballots.

The counters of the paper ballots will not know who voted for which candidate, but they will be assured that only one vote per member coach is counted. This method, while a bit complicated, ensures your vote is private.

Please vote!

Even though there is only one nominee for each position, please show your support by casting a ballot. It tells these volunteers that you appreciate the time they spend making our club the best RV club in the country! •

What's your region?

If you aren't sure what region is associated with your membership, you can find this information on **page 10.** Each region vice president is listed. Following his or her name is the two-letter designation of the region, as well as a list of each state and province (if applicable) within that region.

Mason-Dixon Discoverys chapter


The Mason-Dixons have been busy. We have been reorganizing our tasks and improving our efficiency. We are growing and getting active members.

One man's life

"I licked it; it's mine!"

Those words were spoken almost every night at the dinner table when I was growing up. After all, there were eight of us, plus maybe one or two of my older sisters' dates, all sitting around

the table. My dad would clap his hands really loud just once to get everyone's attention to say grace, and then, just as soon as he was finished and the food hit the table, my brothers and I would grab for the first piece of chicken, or the first slice of roast beef, or the first slab of fish that we could reach and we would lick it and proudly proclaim, "I've licked it; it's mine!" After all, what red-blooded boy would steal and eat another's food after it was licked, right? YUCK! If I didn't lick the food first, one of my brothers would surely steal the meat right off my dish and woof it down, leaving me hungry. My parents couldn't afford seconds with that bunch.

This memory came flooding back to me one day this past July as we were leaving our campsite.

You see, we were at a national forest campground in Dillon, Colo., with a view to kill for and cool breezy nights. A small lake below us held sailboats just gliding along and the tall mountain peaks above the lake still had snow. Sharon, Nilla and I had just spent three glorious days hiking and generally enjoying what this country has to offer in beauty.

We had arrived at the campground on a Wednesday when very few people were there, and we were set to leave on Saturday when the weekend crowds arrive for their loud parties. The campground was booked to capacity for Saturday and Sunday nights. It was Friday evening when the first fellow camper came knocking and said, "I see you are leaving in the morning. Can I have your campsite when you leave?" Then another and another either stopped to ask the question or stooped to examine the departure date tag on the post to campsite #37.

We became concerned enough with the number of people looking at us that we contacted the camp host and explained to them that in the morning there could be a problem as we got ready to leave. I could imagine a half-dozen big young guys jostling each other to be the first one to claim our spot. I fully expected people to start piling their things on our spot during the night to be able to claim it in the morning.

The camp host came by later Friday night and stopped at each site and told the prospective squatters not to bother us, and they could not claim the spot until we were completely out of our campsite in the morning. That seemed to cool their jets and the visits stopped.

We knew the top runners for our site. There was the couple right across from us with the big brown labradoodle (who seemed to be in love with our small white labradoodle), and the young family next to them with three small adorable kids and a large dog, all in a tent. Then there was the lone guy the next loop over. They had all claimed a campsite for Friday night in hopes of getting our primo spot on Saturday morning. The other suitors were further away from us, but circling like sharks looking for their next meal.

Saturday morning came, the sun rose, the snow-covered mountains were just coming into view, I had my first cup of coffee in hand and the campground was waking up. More and more people were walking past, looking at us as if to say, "Aren't you gone yet?" Oh, the vibes were out there, all right.

Care and feeding of land yachts

Batten down the hatches, cast off the bow lines, anchors aweigh ... and don't forget to post!

From the beginnings of our country, hardy pioneers, seeking better lives, braved non-existent roads, a lack of any wayside amenities (except, perhaps, the occasional grove of trees under which to relax and rest), no printed maps, not to mention encountering

perils such as raging rivers, wildfires, horse thieves, etc. I have often marveled at the bravery and drive our early ancestors possessed.

Our modern-day ventures across the country are driven by a desire to see new sights, meet new people, create new and lasting memories. We have GPS, cell phones, computers, frequent fueling places, rest areas, RV campgrounds, interstate highways, etc., to make our trek easy (relatively speaking).

Water heater safety issue

In 2010, I had a 2007 Discovery 39L. Isabel and I were on our way home from Florida in March. At a campground in St. Mary, Ga., we woke up to smoke and a foul order in the bedroom. The smoke and odor were coming from the water heater. After further investigation, it was determined that the 120V

circuit for the heater had shorted and started melting the plastic around the heater. The smell is what pulled me out of my sleep, as I had smelled plastic before as a technician. The heater was tuned off and we aired out the coach. Once arriving home, I pulled the water heater and it was probably 30 seconds from a blaze. I rewired the heater and all was well after that.




Photo 1: This is what the back of the heater looks like. The black box is where the wires are located, the relay and the heating element.



Photo 3: This is the ground wire which is supposed to be white; as you can see, even in this b/w photo, its color has drastically changed. Notice the dark burnt place on the cable. It got super hot.



Photo 5: A close-up view of the burnt wires.

Earlier this year, **Bill and Anne Humphrey** had a short in their water heater. It was the same as my 2007: the wires had became loose and started to run and burn the wires. Bill was lucky in one respect: his circuit breaker tripped. My 2007 never tripped. Bill pulled his water heater out last week and everything was melted. He had to rewire, replace the relay and the heating element – his had gotten that hot before the circuit breaker tripped. Could have resulted in a fire.

So, when Bill advised me on his heater, I made it a point to remove the water heater in my 2010 D for peace of mind. Am I glad I did! The wires were already burnt. It was not a question **if** it would catch on fire – it was **when** it would ignite. Here are photos, documenting the situation and what I did.



Photo 2: In this photo, you will notice the clump of wires, all taped together – hot, ground, and neutral. This is not the way to do it. I cut off the incoming 120V wire and rewired everything.



Photo 4: The water heater out of the D on a ladder. You cannot tell the difference from the white wire and the black wire; even the solid copper wire is black.

In closing, I can report that everything has been replaced, and the heater is back in the coach. It is working well, and I am confident I will have good service and no fires. •

Windows 10

Tou have probably heard that Microsoft **I** has released a new version of Windows Windows 10. The last version was Windows 8, so what happened to Windows 9? Only Microsoft knows the answer to that, but popular conjecture is that Microsoft

wanted to distance themselves from the relatively unpopular Windows 8.

Microsoft really wants everyone to shift to Windows 10 – so much so, that it is a FREE upgrade for anyone with a valid license of Win 7/Win8. But, the real question is ... should you upgrade to it? I think, if you are on Win8, the answer is YES. If you are still on Windows 7, it is not quite as clear.

Win7 will be supported for five more years. By then, you will likely have a new computer. More importantly, you may have older hardware (check with your hardware vendor for Win10 drivers) or software that won't work on Win10. On the other hand, Win10 is much more secure than Win7 and has a bunch of new features..

OK, so you made the decision to switch to Win10 or you bought a new computer with Win10 pre-installed. How do you learn to use it? Here is a *Flipboard* magazine I created that has a bunch of articles. Just copy and paste into your browser: https://flipboard.com/@bobcook4l5v/windows-10-45sd6qply This is a "living" document, so articles will be added in the future. Flipboard is a great alternative to bookmarking sites as you just create "magazines" and add your articles to it.

An excellent option is Lynda.com – this is a commercial site with excellent, professional instructional videos about many topics. There is a Win10 course that assumes you are an absolute computer novice, and the course is organized into topics so you can skip what you don't want to view. There is a free trial which should be long enough for you to take several courses, but many public library systems have a program in place that gives you FREE access to Lynda.com - all you need is a library card. Check with your library; if they don't offer this yet, encourage them to get it.

While on the topic of libraries, many libraries also offer other digital services that are great benefits. My favorite is digital magazines. Using a simple app such as Zinio for Libraries, or just a web browser, I can access and keep - FOR FREE – my favorite magazines on my tablet, phone or laptop. In addition, I can check out digital copies of books or audio books. Although I haven't used it, I can also access movies. And, all of this is free with a library card. I still never physically go to the library, but now I use it all the time wherever I am! �

Editor's note: When I received this article from Bob Cook, I did as he suggested - I viewed his Flipboard magazine. I was amazed at the wealth of information he has provided us! His magazine includes much more than Win 10 how-tos, and I urge you to check it out. 

Hitch receiver weight ratings vs. tow vehicle weight ratings

There has always been confusion over hitch receiver ratings as it pertains to tow vehicle ratings. This confusion applies to both motor homes towing a dinghy and vehicles towing trailers. For example, when I was selling RVs many years ago, I had a customer who just bought a brand

new truck and came to the dealership to purchase a travel trailer. He and his wife found the perfect trailer on the sales lot and wanted some pricing information. When I researched the truck's tow capacity, I informed them the

truck was not rated to tow the weight of the trailer they selected. The customer told me that was impossible because the truck salesperson showed him a label that stated the truck could tow 10,000 pounds. He proceeded to take me out to the truck and pointed at the label on the hitch receiver that read 10,000 pounds. I explained the 10,000 pounds on the



label identifies what the hitch receiver is rated at, but the truck itself was only rated to tow 6,000 pounds. It was a very expensive lesson on finding the RV you want to purchase before you purchase the tow vehicle.

On a separate occasion, I had a customer who wanted to tow a medium-size pickup behind a used motor home he planned to purchase. When I told him the truck weighed too much, he argued that the motor home could easily tow 5,000 pounds. I explained that the motor home might be rated to tow the weight of the truck, but the hitch receiver was only rated to tow 3,500 pounds. On some RVs, when frame rail extensions were added to extend the length of a chassis to accommodate the box size, it jeopardized the towing capacity. To solve the issue, RV manufacturers installed hitch receivers with a lower weight rating to limit the amount of weight the owner would tow behind the RV.

I think you get the point, but the confusion over hitch receiver ratings and tow ratings doesn't stop here. I have talked to many other people who translate the label on the hitch receiver to say if you use a weight distributing hitch, the vehicle can tow more weight.

For starters, hitch receivers are rated by class. What this means is some hitch receivers are designed for **light** duty towing applications and others are designed for **heavy** duty towing applications. Every component in a towing system has a weight rating, and the overall towing capacity is based on the weakest link in the towing chain. This applies to the tow

vehicle (engine, transmission, axle ratio, cooling system, brakes and tires) and the hitch components used (receiver, ball mount, hitch ball, safety chains and weight distributing hitch components). The hitch receiver and all other components in the towing chain should be rated to tow the maximum amount of weight the tow vehicle itself is rated to tow, but if the receiver is rated for a higher amount of weight, it **does not** increase the tow vehicle <u>vehicle's</u> maximum capacity.

Hitch receiver weight ratings are based on "maximum trailer weight" and "maximum tongue weight" for which

the receiver is rated. Class I and II hitch receivers are designed for light duty applications and have a 1¹/₄ " receiver tube opening. Class III, IV and V hitch receivers are designed for heavy duty applications and have 2" receiver tube openings. There Note: extra-heavy duty commercial-duty hitch receivers too, with 2½"

receiver tube openings designed for extra-heavy duty towing applications.

Class III, IV and V hitch receivers have two weight ratings; one if it is used as a Weight Carrying (WC) hitch, and another as a Weight Distributing (WD) hitch.

A WC hitch means all of the trailer's tongue weight is supported by the hitch itself, which accounts for the lower weight capacity at which the hitch receiver is rated. When you add WD distributing components (spring bars) to the equation, the trailer's tongue weight is distributed to the axles on the tow vehicle and axles on the trailer, resulting in a higher weight capacity for the hitch receiver itself.

Always keep in mind, however, this higher hitch receiver weight rating has nothing to do with what the vehicle is rated to tow. It simply means if you use a WD hitch, the hitch receiver is rated for more weight because all of the tongue weight is not resting on the hitch receiver itself. Another important point to keep in mind: the hitch receiver must be installed properly for the weight ratings to be accurate. �

28 RV safe driving tips

- 1. Always wear your seat belt while operating your RV. Seat belts function primarily to keep you in the vehicle, even in the seat, if the vehicle leaves the highway or is involved in a collision.
- Side-view mirrors should be adjusted so that you can just barely see the side of your RV. This reduces the size of your blind spot. Adjust the convex mirrors to include blind spots, keeping in mind that objects may appear farther away than they actually are. Rearview mirrors can have the same effect.
- 3. Use your headlights to make yourself more visible to oncoming traffic.
- 4. Back in, not out. When you pull out front-forward, you can see the traffic conditions and are not dependent upon another person. Also, most of the time it's easier to maneuver in tight places by backing in.
- 5. If you must back out, get out and look things over before doing so. Confirm that there are no overhangs, low branches, or anything sticking out of the ground that you might run over or that could damage the undercarriage of your RV. Many hazards are not visible from inside the vehicle.
- Maintain a steady, consistent speed, close to the speed limit.
- 7. When turning corners, use the push-pull steering method. Place one hand at the twelve o'clock position and pull down while pushing up with the other hand.
- 8. If your right-hand wheels leave the roadway, do not jerk the steering wheel to try to bring the wheels back onto the roadway. Instead, remove your foot from the accelerator, apply pressure to the brake pedal in an effort to slow the vehicle, and keep your steering wheel in a straight-ahead position. Slow the vehicle enough to enter the roadway without swerving onto it.
- 9. If you see traffic building up behind you, the first thing you should do is place your vehicle to the far right of the lane you are traveling in to let the vehicles behind you clearly view traffic without pulling out into the lane of opposing traffic. Find a safe place to pull over and let the vehicles pass, even if you are traveling the speed limit or slightly above it.
- 10. If you must pass another vehicle on a two-lane road, consider how much time it will take to get around that vehicle. Rather than waiting for a clear area to pass and then accelerating to passing speed, drop back and start acceleration so you are already at passing speed when it is clear to pass.

- 11. When entering a freeway, use the first portion of the onramp to look back and find a gap in traffic to move into. Use the second portion of the on-ramp to build up speed so you can move into the gap at approximately the same speed that traffic is moving. Merging can be difficult with an RV. You must take into consideration your vehicle's additional weight and slower acceleration and ease onto expressways very carefully.
- A solid white line on an entrance to a freeway is a traffic control line and should not be crossed.
- 13. When exiting a freeway, move into the far right lane half a mile to a mile before your exit. Doing this avoids your having to find a gap in traffic to move into at the last minute. Waiting usually means slowing down in the second or third lane, which makes the process of moving over more difficult.
- 14. When the white line markers that separate the lane you are in from the one next to you begin to appear more frequently (more than twice as many white lines), that means your lane is separating from the main highway. If this happens and you do not want to exit, signal and try to move over one lane as quickly as possible.
- 15. If you travel in the right lane on the freeway, do not attempt to slow down for traffic entering a freeway, unless required by law. Maintain a steady, consistent speed and allow entering motorists to adjust their speed to the speed of traffic. This prevents you from slowing down the traffic behind you and allows for an overall smoother flow of traffic. If the lane to your immediate left is clear, move into it temporarily to allow ramp traffic to enter the expressway uninhibited.
- 16. Be prepared for any possibility when you see a vehicle stopped by the roadside. Someone could open the door and get out; someone could suddenly come around from the other side to make a driver change; or the vehicle could suddenly pull out into traffic without warning. If possible, move to another lane until you have passed the stopped vehicle.
- 17. The most common complaint drivers have about other drivers is their failure to use turn signals. Turn signals are valuable for communicating your intentions to other drivers. If you don't signal, other drivers have no way of knowing what you are going to do.
- 18. Use your flashers whenever you are stopped near moving traffic or when you are in a lane of traffic proceeding slowly up a grade.
- 19. Whenever you see a condition ahead that may force you to make an unplanned stop, tap your brake pedal three or Continued on next page...

four times to warn vehicles behind you that you may make a quick stop. Remember that following cars can't see around RVs because of their large size. Use your brake lights to communicate to traffic behind you.

- 20. Use your horn as a warning device when necessary. Honk two or three times before backing up if your vehicle is not equipped with a reverse beeper. A light tap can also be used to warn someone who doesn't see you, such as a pedestrian or cyclist. In dangerous situations, such as an impending head-on crash, you can use a constant pressure on the horn to warn other drivers.
- 21. Use your emergency flares to warn other motorists that you are broken down and parked on or near the highway surface.
- 22. Position your vehicle so that other drivers can easily see it and avoid traveling in others' blind spots. When you must travel through another operator's blind spot, do so as quickly as possible.
- 23. You should be able to recognize road signs by their shape and color.
- 24. To know what is going on ahead of you, look 15 to 20 seconds ahead. That way you'll have advanced warning if you need to take action.
- 25. Stay aware of what is going on behind you as well. Check your mirrors frequently.

- 26. If you are uncomfortable in heavy traffic and want to avoid traffic bunch-ups, one of the easiest ways to do this is to drop your speed to about two miles per hour less than the prevailing traffic speed. Once the bunch moves on, you may be able to resume your old speed and travel between bunches.
- 27. RVs are larger and heavier than autos and therefore take more time and distance to stop. Maintain at least a four- to six-second interval between your vehicle and other vehicles. You can determine this distance by observing the vehicle in front of you. When the rear bumper passes an object, such as a sign or mile marker, start counting. You should be able to count four seconds before your front bumper reaches the same marker.
- 28. Cover your brakes. When you approach a situation that makes you uneasy, place your foot over the brake pedal without actually touching it. This reduces reaction time if your hunch proves correct and you need to quickly apply the brakes. ❖

Inverter problems

This is just a heads-up on a problem I have had with my inverter. I believe two other DOAI members have had or are having the same problem. Perhaps some of you with the newer coaches may fit into this category. My suggestion is for

you to take the time to check your inverters or have a competent technician check them out — probably an electrician. Here is what I discovered when I went into my inverters.

The photo on the right is of the inverter wires that I have removed from the inside of the converter. I have changed out three of six wire connectors from a red connector to a yellow. The yellow is for two #12 wires which are being connected. The red is for four #12 wires.

By using the larger red connector, it is really hard or just impossible to get a good connection. With this



connector, the wires will work loose and begin rubbing, which will cause electrical sparks, which will lead to a fire...which I almost had. I have re-wired both of my inverters and you will notice that there is only one red connector. This connector connects all the ground wires together (four of them). I have used the yellow connector to connect the two #12 wires, plus taped them for safety. Others out there may have the same problem. You will only know if you have inverter problems or unless you do as I have done: open the inverter and check the wires. I had red connectors fall off the wires when I pulled them out of the inverter.

Top ten consumable items to always have in your RV



When you go camping in your RV, there are items that are essential, such as a drinking water hose and RV sewer hoses, and there are nice to have items, like a GPS designed for RVs and a portable BBQ grill.

In no particular order, here are my top ten consumable items we keep in the RV:

- ① For starters, you need holding tank treatments to treat the black water holding tank after you empty it. There are dry and liquid type holding tank treatments available. I suggest products that are biodegradable and environmentally friendly. **Camping Tip**: After emptying the gray water holding tank, you can add some liquid dish soap down all the drains and run the water long enough to get the soap past the P trap and to cover the bottom of the tank. The dish soap and water will help control odors and assist in cleaning the tank.
- While we are on the subject of holding tanks, it's a good idea to stock up on toilet paper designed for use in RVs. This is one consumable item you don't want to leave home without. Camping Tip: To see if toilet paper is compatible with your RV waste-water system, put one sheet of the toilet paper in a glass of water. If it starts to break down and fall apart within a few seconds of being in the water, it is suitable for use in RVs.
- 3 Laundry soap and dish soap are must-have consumable items, too. Clothes are going to get dirty and need to be washed, especially if your camping trip is more than a weekend excursion. You can purchase these items at the campground store, but it is less expensive to purchase them where you normally shop and just keep them in the RV.
- Wext on my list is a well stocked cabinet of first aid supplies and over-the-counter medications. You never know when an accident will happen, or when somebody will get sick. If you are boondocking miles from the closest town or store, you'll be glad you have these consumable items along for the ride. If you or someone else is on prescription medication, make sure you have an ample supply for the duration of your trip, and don't forget the sunscreen. (Editor's note: for a list of first aid kit contents that includes these items and many more, see page 17, July 2015 Discovery Express.)
- Next is hand sanitizer and three percent hydrogen peroxide solution in a spray bottle. I keep a bottle of hand sanitizer in the compartment where the sewer connection is made, so it's handy when I do my wastewater management chores. I keep a spray bottle of hydrogen peroxide in the same compartment, so I

- can disinfect the hose bib prior to connecting my RV drinking hose to the water connection at the campground. Inside the RV, we keep hand sanitizer at each sink, and hydrogen peroxide for general cleaning and disinfecting in and around the RV.
- 6 Another consumable item I always have in the outside storage compartment is a supply of disposable gloves. They are inexpensive and can be used for all kinds of chores and routine maintenance on the RV.
- In my tool storage compartment I keep a can of spray lubricant available. It should be a dry type lubricant, like graphite, that won't attract dust, dirt and other debris. I personally use Boeshield T9 spray lubricant for everything on the RV. It cleans, lubricates and protects whatever you use it on. Camping Tip: At least twice a year, spray inside all of the lock mechanisms on the RV. This will keep the locks operating properly and help prevent them from freezing during the cold winter months.
- Next on my list is disposable tableware. This includes paper plates, napkins, cutlery, cups and tablecloths. You can use regular tableware on most occasions, but sometimes it's just easier to use disposable products.
- I don't know about you, but I am a big fan of zip ties. I use zip ties for all kinds of things when we are on RV trips. They are fairly inexpensive and after they have served their purpose, you can discard them.
- ① Last, but certainly not least, is good old duct tape. If zip ties won't solve the problem, duct tape usually will. I always keep a roll of duct tape in my tool storage compartment where it's easy to locate when I need it.

Well, there you have it: my top ten list of consumable items to always have in the RV. There are many other consumable products that could or should be on this list, like doggy clean-up bags if you travel with pets. Responsible pet owners always clean-up after their pets. You can use this list as a starting point and add to it to devise your own special RV checklist of consumable items to keep in your RV. And remember, when you dispose of consumable items, recycle whenever possible. �
