Synopsis of Board of Directors Meeting by Marshall Godwin, Secretary pro tem


The DOAI board meeting was held on February 16, 2007 in Seffner, Florida.

- Meeting called to order by President Phil Yovino. All board members present except the past president, secretary, Southwest and Northwest regions vice presidents.
- Phil thanked those who worked to make this a very successful rally. He also thanked the board for their ability to work together in the best interests of the association.
- Minutes from the last board of directors meeting held October 4, 2006 were read and accepted.
- The treasurer's report was accepted as read.
- Unfinished business: Jay Keneson is working on the rally handbook, and the draft should be available for review at the 2007 national rally.

New business:

- ★ Standing Rule 3, Par. E3 was discussed to reinforce need for compliance when setting up major rally petty cash account.
- Standing Rule 3, Par. E2: Motion carried to read: Costs of DOAI merchandise sold at regional and national rallies shall be repaid to the DOAI from the sales

proceeds. The merchandise director's rally fee will be paid from the gross sales. Any profits from such sales shall be retained by the host chapter(s).



- DOAI tenth anniversary: This occurs in 2008. Motion carried to read: Swap region rotation dates with Southeast and North Central regions to allow 2008 national rally to be held in Richmond, Indiana, to commemorate the association's tenth anniversary.
- Caterpillar engines: Consensus to send letters to Fleetwood and Freightliner, indicating DOAI's desire that members retain the option to purchase new Discoverys with Caterpillar engines.
- Note made that it is time to send out letters to major newsletter sponsors, asking for their continued support in 2007.
- Discovery flags: Motion carried to read: Investigate purchasing tenth anniversary Discovery flags to be presented as gifts to those who attend the 2008 national rally.
- Meeting adjourned

Help with Sites for Future National Rallies

Tt's time for a word about our national rallies. I'm sure Leveryone is aware of our upcoming rally in November 2007 in Arizona. Also, as previously announced, we have varied the normal regional rotation for 2008 to hold our tenth anniversary rally, Back Home Again in Indiana, where it all began.

The Southeast Region will host the 2010 national rally as a one-time change. Then the normal cyclic rotation will resume; 2009 will be Northwest, 2011 will be Northeast; and 2012 will be South Central.

I again listed the years and regions responsible in order to request your help. Your region vice president, along with your national rally master, is working on sites for future rallies. Do you have a favorite park, fairground, or rally site where you would like to have the next national rally?

We need the following amenities when planning a rally:

- ► 150-200 available spaces
- ► At least 30 amp electrical service
- ► Water and sewer hook-ups (nice, but not essential)

▶ Meeting hall large enough for 425-450 persons seated for a meal, with tables and chairs, a stage for entertainment, space for two seminars at the same time with about 200 attendees each, and space for vendors (15-20) with booths and tables.



Our next rally will be at Canton, Texas, for Trade Days, June 1-3, at the Canton Civic Center and RV Park.



DOAI Web site. If you don't have a map program or a GPS, then here is a compelling reason to get one!


Your DOAI Web site offers more than 60 map overlay files to help quickly and easily find and identify a member campground, RV service center, or a dump station (just to name a few). A map overlay file is software that works with your mapping program (such as

Delorme, CoPilot, Microsoft) or a stand-alone GPS unit (such as Garmin, Magellan) to graphically show you RV-specific information that is not available on your software program or GPS.

With these map overlays, you can easily route a trip to take advantage of member campgrounds along the way, find places to boondock, or find the nearest facility for coach service. You will likely find that, in no time at all, you have saved enough

map software!

Fleetwood Technical Information

Pre-Trip Checklist



In coming issues we will be creating several articles on maintenance and care that range from interior care to exterior care to winterization and also reactivating your RV.

This issue's article is about your pre-trip checklist. The key to having a good time on your getaway is making sure your coach is ready for

travel before you depart, so that your trip can be carefree and enjoyable. Here are some easy-to-use checklists that can help you get ready.

Pre-Trip Preparations

____Air Conditioner/ Furnace: Check for proper operation, shore power and generator

____Batteries: Check all terminals and connections. Make sure they are clean and tight, make sure cells are full of distilled water if they are not maintenance-free batteries.

___Brakes: Test brakes (including parking) for proper operation

___Entertainment System: Test TV antenna, satellite dish, and DVD/VCR for proper operation

___Exterior Lights and Horns: Turn on all lights and turn indicators, and test the horn for proper operation

___Propane: Check that the tank is full. Turn on water heater (must be full of water), range, oven, refrigerator, and furnace. Note: It may take more than one attempt to light to purge the air

out of the lines.

___Safety Equipment: Test smoke, CO, and LPG detectors to ensure they are operating correctly.

____Fire Extinguisher: Verify it is fully charged

___Tires: Check tire pressure and adjust to the tire manufacturer's load specifications; check tread for cuts, abrasions, unusual wear, or embedded objects. Make sure valves and caps are free of dirt and moisture.

____Towing System: Check tow bar, mounting brackets, trailer hitch, pins, safety chains, and connections for cracks, frayed wiring, loose connections, rust, or any other damage that affects safety. Before departure make sure hitch and towing connections are complete. Check trailer of towed vehicle brake system and lights for proper operation. Consult chassis manufacturer owner/operator manuals for weighing instructions and towing guidelines, including towed vehicle auxiliary brake requirements.

Before Driving Away

Before pulling away check the items below to make sure every thing is secured and ready to travel.

___Access Doors: Close and lock all storage and access doors ___Awning: Make sure the awnings are retracted and latched. ___Cabinets and Drawers: Close and secure cabinets and drawers. Do not store heavy items in overhead.

 Counter Tops: Clear counter tops, range top, table tops,
- ___Leveling Jacks: Make sure leveling jacks are fully retracted
- Power Cords: Disconnect and store

and shelves of unsecured items.

- ____Power Steps: Before departure; verify that the coach steps are in the up (stowed position) once all travelers are inside.
- ___Roof Antennas: Make sure all antennas are lowered and stowed
- ____Windows and Vents: Close all windows and vents while traveling
- ___Water Systems: Set the fresh water pump to "OFF". Faucets, including the showerhead, should all be closed "OFF".

Essentials for Your Trip

Here is a convenient list of essentials you should consider taking with you, whenever you leave home for the open road.

___Batteries: Stock enough batteries to operate flashlights, portable lanterns, smoke detectors, and remote control units.

___Cell Phone: The E911 federal legislation requires, at a minimum, you can place a 911 call from any location where you have reception regardless of any network calling plan restrictions.



__Flashlights: Carry several flashlights, including a small penlight flashlight for those hard-to-reach places. A hands-free

snake light, as well as a larger flood lamp, can be very helpful.

____Fuses, Chassis and Coach: Carry an additional set of 12 volt fuses for both the automotive and house systems.

___NOAA Weather Radio: A NOAA emergency weather radio will provide warnings of severe weather in the area you are traveling through.

___Prescription Medications: Make sure an adequate amount of prescription medications are in the RV before your departure.

____RV Fluids: Securely store spare antifreeze, motor oil, hydraulic fluid, and other fluid necessities in sealed containers in case of emergency.

____Safety Triangles and Roadside Flares: Invaluable in case of roadside breakdowns. Flares older than two years should be properly discarded and replaced.

The 2008 Discovery Is Here!

Those who attended the 2006 national rally in San Antonio may remember Fred Flickinger, the friendly sales associate from Ancira RV in Boerne. A few weeks ago he called to happily inform me that a new 2008 had just arrived and that it was a never-before-seen new model, a 39R.

The next day Lorrie and I drove over to Boerne, and we both agreed: **It is the best plan ever.** I know that you will wish to view one of these beauties yourself and form your own opinion. In the meantime, let me describe the highlights for you:

Like the 39V, the 39R has a full 27-foot wall slide on the driver's side, and a deep slide in the bedroom on the co-pilot's side, as well as the same interior features. Now, *add* another slide on the co-pilot's side, like the one in the 39L, with all of those features and options. See the floorplan below.

The actual feel when experiencing it is space, space, and more space!

Changes starting at the front begin with a one-piece windshield, and inside deluxe memory front seats. In the living room there is a nicer trim on the two sofas. In the bedroom the TV has an improved positioning feature. A tentative feature for later production is the possibility of a king-sized bed, which we would prefer.

On the exterior, the graphics are attractive (see image below and in color on page 23). A new color for 2008 is Wine, joining the Iron and Pacific Blue exterior colors. There are two compartments which open on side hinges. The one in front of the back tire on the co-pilot side goes through the midline of the coach, providing a space for a spare or additional storage; the next forward with through access, providing space for long ladders, tables, etc.

Many have been waiting for the return of the Cummins engine. It's back with 350 HP, but it is the quietest, cleanest running diesel I have experienced. The noise level is so low, one must listen closely to insure one is truly next to a diesel.

I think Fleetwood has a real winner with this model. Now I just wish I could afford to buy one!

Safe Driving for RVers

Sharing the Road with Truckers

Today, there are more vehicles on the road than ever. That's why it's especially important to be conscious of other drivers who share the road with us. Take tractor-trailers, for example. Such large and heavy vehicles require special consideration as you encounter them in your travels.

As tension on the road increases, hostility between truckers and other motorists continues to grow as well. It is our responsibility as drivers to be both respectful and safe on the road. Understanding truckers is the first step toward better relations. Perhaps by understanding their situation, and by learning how to work with them, we can do our part to diminish the problem.

Understanding Truckers

As with other operators, the overwhelming majority of truckers are courteous, careful, and highly skilled. They're professionals whose "office" happens to be the road. Truckers have a very difficult job. They have a responsibility to get a large vehicle with a heavy load to a destination, often with a very tight deadline. As traffic on the roadways becomes more congested and drivers become more aggressive, a trucker's job becomes more difficult.

Many truck drivers work away from home for two- or three-week periods. Some company drivers share the cab of a

tractor with another driver, driving for four hours and trying to sleep for four hours. If we consider the number of times they have experienced inconsiderate acts by other operators in their many miles, we can begin to understand truckers' frustration.

Trucker Communication

Truck drivers usually communicate by flashing their lights or by CB radio. When one truck passes another, the vehicle being passed flashes his headlights on to signal to the passing driver that the passing move is complete and the trucker is clear to pull back into the lane. If a driver is running with headlights on, the driver might turn them off briefly to give the same signal. Naturally, a trucker knows when his or her truck has cleared the vehicle being passed, but they signal each other in this manner as a greeting or as evidence of the respect they have for each other.

Once the passing vehicle has started to move back into the lane, the passing driver will usually acknowledge the flashing of headlights by flashing either the clearance lights on the back of the trailer, or four-way or emergency flashers. RVers can learn to communicate with each other and with truckers in the same manner.

Remember to observe trucks you are passing to determine if the headlights are on so you will not misinterpret the headlight signal. Some trucks run with their headlights on; others have daytime running lights just as other vehicles do.

Headlights are also used to communicate when another vehicle is entering an expressway. If a trucker encounters another truck entering the expressway, he will briefly turn on

his headlights to signal the other driver and will create space for the vehicle. The trucker will also use this signal when passing another truck on a multi-lane highway if the truck being passed is quickly coming upon another vehicle and preparing to pass. Once both vehicles are past the slower vehicle, the other driver will pull back into the right lane and allow the second truck to finish his pass. If the exchange takes place when headlights are in use, the driver in the overtaking vehicle will momentarily turn off his headlights.

RVers can do the same as truckers. Vehicles equipped with daytime running lights may have a switch that enables the driver to momentarily turn off the headlights. In vehicles equipped with daytime running lights that cannot be turned off, during daylight hours drivers can turn on their high beams and leave them on for a few seconds. The signal will not be misinterpreted for a passing signal if performed in this manner. Some trucks are equipped with lights that are on all the time, and they use this method to signal each other.

The CB radio is also a helpful communication tool, but many times things happen so quickly that it is easier to use the lights as a signaling device. Whenever the CB radio is used, truckers always refer to the other vehicle by the company name or the brand name of the tractor, often referring to the color as well. This specific identification is used because a radio signal

> travels a good distance and another driver may misinterpret the message.

Working Together with Truck Drivers

There are lots of little things we can do to help our companions on the road. On those occasions when a truck passes you on an interstate and you soon

approach a hill that will cause you to catch back up with it near the top of the hill, disengage your cruise control. Follow the truck up to the crest of the hill with the knowledge that after you top the hill, the truck is going to be out of your range.

Another thing we can do to make truckers' jobs a little easier is to become more aware of parking in rest areas. Often we see rest areas filled with recreation vehicles parked right in the center near the rest rooms. The rest areas may be so full that a trucker can't stop to use the facilities. A more considerate way to handle parking at rest stops is to stop in the outlying lanes or, if the area is fairly full, park along the side or at the end of the rest area away from the marked lanes. Handle overnight stops in the same manner.

If you use the truck pumps to fill your vehicle, when you are finished you should pull forward far enough to open up the fuel lane for a truck or another RV (especially at a Flying J RV island) before you go in to pay your bill. In a service area, stop your motor home and signal a trucker that it is okay to pull out in front of you so he doesn't have to wait. Truckers do these things for each other – so should we.



Safe Driving for RVers, continued Being "Truck Smart"

There's very little room for error or ignorance around tractortrailers. Following are some safety tips from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation:

- Stay out of a trucker's blind spots or "No Zone," where your vehicle is not visible by the trucker. Because trucks are so much bigger than cars, they have bigger blind spots. If you can't see the truck driver's face in the side mirrors, the trucker can't see you.
- When you pass a truck, do it carefully and do it quickly. Don't linger. Riding alongside could put you in the trucker's No Zone.
- Never pull in front of a truck and slow down. You will quickly eliminate the truck driver's cushion of safety and create a very hazardous situation.
- Keep to the right when a truck is passing you. You may even want to slow down to make passing you easier for the trucker.
- Keep your distance when you see a truck backing or turning. These can be difficult maneuvers, so help out by leaving plenty of room.

- You will feel increased wind turbulence when passing a truck or when a truck passes you, so adjust your steering appropriately.
- Keep your cool. No matter what happens on the road, you can't let your emotions get the best of you while you're driving.

Following these safety tips will increase your safety on the road and will go a long way toward building good relationships between RVers and truckers. And even if you don't get the desired result from a trucker, you can feel good knowing you did the right thing. Frank Warren, a professional driver for Yellow Freight, says it best: "There has to be a two-way street when it comes to safety and courtesy. The truck driver and the motorist must learn to live with one another out on the highway. We've got to respect each other."

Hints and Tips for RVers

Overnight Parking Etiquette ... by Nina Soltwedel In reading a recent issue of the FMCA magazine, I came across a page entitled "RVers' Good Neighbor Policy." The article stated that "most respected RV consumer clubs have joined together to support your right to park on private businesses' parking lots overnight", and the following industry-sanctioned Code of Conduct was included. It's listed here for your information.

- 1. Stay one night only!
- 2. Obtain permission from a qualified individual.
- 3. Obey posted regulations.
- 4. No awnings, chairs, or barbecue grills.
- 5. Do not use hydraulic jacks on soft surfaces (including asphalt).
- 6. Always leave an area cleaner than you found it.
- Purchase gas, food, or supplies as a form of thank you, when feasible.
- 8. Be safe! Always be aware of your surroundings and leave if you feel unsafe.

Item #4 above reminded me of an experience we had in Ellsworth, Maine, several years ago as we wended our way home from New Brunswick. (Ellsworth is the major city outside Arcadia National Park.) We pulled into the Wal-Mart parking lot and proceeded to ask the manager if it would be OK to park there overnight. He responded that he was sorry, but the city had made it unlawful for RVs to park anywhere except in an RV park.

He went on to tell us that RVers used to park in the Wal-Mart lot (and other lots throughout the town) for extended periods of time, with awnings out, barbecue grills set up, and parties going on. The RV park owners in and near the town petitioned the city council to forbid the practice. In other words, a few RVers ruined it for the rest of us.

Another year, on our way to Alaska, we stayed overnight (with permission) in the Wal-Mart lot in Great Falls, Montana. The next morning, while purchasing supplies, I encountered the store manager. I thanked him for allowing us to stay overnight. He responded, "Hey, it's a two-way street. You appreciate staying here, and we appreciate your business."

The clubs referred to in the first paragraph are Escapees RV Club, FMCA, Gulfstreamers International Recreational Vehicle Club, Born Free Leap'n Lions RV Club, Wally Byam Caravan Club International, and Life on Wheels. Perhaps DOAI could follow suit?

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Dr. Dometic Says . . .

Tips and Tricks for Awning Maintenance by Dometic Corporation

n awning can be the front porch of your RV. Awnings can help fill your living room with gentle breezes on a warm day ... can provide your outdoor dining room with a full view of fireflies ... and be your sanctuary during a gentle rain. They are some of the best investments you can make in your RV lifestyle.

Patio, window, door, and slideout awnings are not just accessories, but important additions, as they protect your furniture and draperies from sun damage, allow open windows during light rain showers, and keep your RV cooler. They can provide long-term comfort and performance with simple, routine maintenance and cleaning. A few easy tricks and tips can keep them colorful and standing tall for years.

For safe and secure travel, make sure the awning is properly rolled up, in a locked travel position, and that travel latches are down. Verify that the push buttons are locked

in the prepunched holes, and lock the cam lever. Also, tighten all adjustment knobs and make sure the top and bottom bracket screws are tight.

Periodic cleanings will ensure a beautiful, ready-to-use awning when you arrive at your destination. Awnings come in two fabrics – cloth-type acrylic and vinyl – and each must be cleaned differently. Acrylic awnings have the color woven into the fabric. They are water repellent, but not waterproof. To clean an acrylic awning, simply hose it off occasionally and let it dry. Do not scrub it, as this could remove its water retardant finish. To remove a grease spot, Dometic suggests using K2r[®] Stain Remover.

Acrylic is a woven cloth that allows air to circulate through the fabric so dew and rain can dry quickly. However, you should avoid touching the underside of an acrylic awning when it is wet. Touching it will break the surface tension and allow seepage through the fabric. If it is necessary to roll up an awning while it is wet, unroll it as soon as the weather allows. It should be completely dry before rolling it up again

to avoid mildew.

While a vinyl awning is mildew resistant, mildew can still form on the dirt and dust that sticks to the awning. To avoid these problems, use a mixture of a quarter-cup dish detergent,

a quarter-cup bleach, and five gallons of fresh water. Soap the open awning with this mixture, then roll it up to soak for five minutes, applying the mixture to the bottom of the awning as you roll. Next, open the awning and hose it off with fresh water on the top and bottom. After the awning is completely dry, roll it up. To remove a grease spot from a vinyl awning, use only soap and water. Do not use household cleaners, mildew removers, or hard bristle brushes.

Once you are parked and ready to enjoy your patio awning, keep a few things in mind

while setting up. To avoid water pooling, lower one end of the awning for proper water runoff. Before opening the entry door, be sure the patio or door awning is extended high enough so the door won't rub against it. If you are expecting heavy or prolonged wind or rain, or if you will be leaving the awning unattended, it's best to roll it up. Damage as a result of weather is most likely not covered by warranty.

Taking a few minutes for some simple maintenance steps will keep your awnings looking and performing great. With a little TLC they will provide years of convenient shading, protection and enjoyment that all awnings promise, including firefly shows from the comfort of your portable front porch.

Preparing for a Medical Emergency on the Road Aon Recreation Insurance

Remember the saying, "The best defense is a good offense"? One of the best decisions you can make as a frequent traveler is to be prepared for a medical emergency on the road. Being properly prepared can help you quickly and efficiently assist a person in need. That person could be someone you love

The first step in this process is to get certified in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Whether you're young, old, traveling alone or with companions, you can benefit from learning CPR. CPR can double a person's chance of recovery from cardiac arrest. The training also teaches you how to alleviate choking dangers with the Heimlich maneuver. Courses are offered at most colleges, hospitals and American Red Cross offices for around \$20. Some RV rallies provide training at a discounted rate.

Your second preparation tool is a well-stocked first aid kit. Don't just take supplies out of your medicine cabinet to create a kit. Consider buying a kit that's already put together to ensure you don't forget anything. Be sure to add the extra items for your specific needs like extra medication, dietary requirements or pet supplies. John Adams, instructor of Aon Recreation Insurance's medical emergency preparedness seminar, cautions: "Note that many items in the kit have expiration dates and will need to be kept current." Basic kits can be purchased at Wal-Mart for about \$10.

Carry a medical guide with you or, at the very least, be prepared to recognize the symptoms of major life-threatening afflictions that can strike suddenly. The American Heart Association has summarized a list of the most common ones:

- → Heart attack symptoms: chest discomfort, discomfort in other areas of the upper body, shortness of breath, cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- ➤ Stroke warning signs: sudden numbness or weakness of face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body; sudden confusion or trouble speaking; sudden trouble seeing with one eye or both; sudden trouble walking; dizziness; loss of balance or coordination or sudden severe headache with no known cause.
- ➤ Cardiac arrest symptoms: Sudden loss of responsiveness with no response to gentle shaking, no normal breathing for several seconds, no signs of circulation and no movement or coughing.

Helping Others Help You

If you're traveling, it's particularly important to prepare paperwork for each traveler that documents medications, conditions and allergies. Also include a one-page letter from your doctor explaining your medical condition and a current EKG strip if you've had an EKG. Keep this paperwork in a *Vial of Life* (a large pill bottle that can hold your medical paperwork) or a clearly-labeled freezer bag. Emergency

Medical Technicians (EMTs) will look for it in your freezer, medicine cabinet and glove compartment of your car if you're traveling.

EMTs are hesitant to look in your wallet or purse for medical information until they reach the emergency room and a witness can watch them do it, so you may want to wear a medical alert bracelet or necklace. If you have too many items to fit on the small face of the jewelry, you can now sign up for a service that assigns a code to you that is printed on the jewelry. When the EMT calls into the hospital, your code is used to access your medical information from a nationwide network.

Communication is the Key

With all the people on the road today, there are many communications options to help you find the assistance you need in a medical emergency.

Many states have posted road signs that signify the location of hospitals or aid stations. Keep an eye out for these as you're traveling; you never know when it will become useful information.

While they can be noisy and distracting, CB radios can help keep you informed of things happening down the road. They can be a life-saving tool to communicate with others in an emergency.

Cell phones are most people's preferred mode of communication while traveling. They're easy to carry, and nowadays service is available in most areas. Remember to keep your phone charged at all times. If you don't want the expense of keeping a cell phone service operating, you can keep one without service that should still work in an emergency as long as you're in an area with cellular service. According to a decree by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), all cell phones, even ones without an active service plan, must be able to dial 911.

If You're Not the Primary Driver

If you've never before driven the RV, you should at least learn the basics. You don't want to drive it for the first time in an emergency. When traveling by RV, it's possible that in an emergency you will find yourself far from medical assistance. If the primary driver is hurt, you may be in a situation where you need to drive to get help.

If you're the passenger and the driver of your vehicle loses consciousness, try not to panic. The first thing to do is move the driver's hands and feet away from the steering wheel and pedals. Next, climb over, sit on the edge of the driver's seat and take control of the vehicle. Slow it down and move to the side of the road. To keep use of the power steering and brakes, don't turn the engine off until the vehicle has completely stopped. You must control and stop the vehicle before tending to the driver.

RVs have vast differences in how they drive, so you should practice driving the vehicle in which you'll spend most of your time. It's important to learn the basics of accelerating,

turning and stopping. If possible, take one of the driving courses offered at many RV rallies year-round.

Overnight Stays

When staying at campgrounds it's important to take advantage of the map provided on check-in - it contains valuable information you'll need in an emergency, including the campground street address and a map to your campsite. If you need to call 911, you have to be able to give the operator a physical address for them to dispatch help to you. It's also very important to be able to give them directions to find you within the campground. Keep the map with your cell phone so it will be easily accessible if you need it. If you don't use a cell phone, keep the map in the same place each time you stop for the night and don't forget to throw out the old one so you don't get them mixed up.

When you're in areas that have severe weather, such as hurricanes, tornados or blizzards, be sure to note what county you are currently camped in. Radio weather bulletins are announced by county. Also, if weather danger is nearby, listen to the radio to find out where the safe building is so you can get there quickly if the need arises.

Having a Backup Team

Anything can happen down the road - preparation will help you to remain calm and focus on the emergency. Many insurance providers now offer emergency expense coverage that bridges the gap of additional expenses RV owners might incur that are not covered by conventional medical insurance.

It's important to be familiar with what your medical insurance will and will not cover. The beauty of traveling by RV is you feel free to visit parts of the country that are more remote and far from civilization. However, if an emergency occurs, an airlift to the nearest hospital can cost more than \$10,000, which most medical insurance plans will not cover, and services typically require payment up front. Supplemental emergency medical plans can cover this and also extras like:

➤ Return of your vehicle home for you if you are not able to do it yourself.

- ➤ Return of your dependents and pets home.
- ➤ Coverage of meals and accommodations for your traveling companion if you're hospitalized.
- ➤ Transport of a family member or loved one to be with you if you're hospitalized.
- → Transportation home for you if your medical condition requires you be sent home to recuperate or receive further treatment.

When shopping for a medical emergency plan provider, find out what geographical areas the plan covers to be sure it matches with the areas you travel in most. Look for plans that include unlimited emergency cash and no deductibles. Also be sure to choose a plan that doesn't have a mandatory waiting period or a pre-existing condition clause that prevents you from being covered if your condition was diagnosed before you applied for membership. Additionally, check the cost of extras before committing to a plan – some plans offer all services for one annual price, while others offer a base plan and charge for additional benefits like helicopter transfer. Annual premiums can vary dramatically, ranging from \$139-\$420 depending on the provider. Investment in this relatively inexpensive extra coverage can give you peace of mind so you can rest a little easier during your travels.




